On Exhibit at Museums Near & Far

Briscoe Western Art Museum, San Antonio, Texas

Museo del Vaquero de las Californias, El Triunfo, Baja California Sur, Mexico

Also referred to as MuVaCa, the Cowboy Museum of the Californias presents more than 300 years of history of the origins of the vaquero and ranchero culture in the Californias. This bilingual, bicultural and multimedia museum is located in the historic town of El Triunfo, Baja California Sur — near the southern tip of Baja California between La Paz and Cabo San Lucas

The Museum opened in November of 2022 and obtained copies of

nine images including a daguerreotype of Pio Pico and his family, one of Anita Pico with Catarina Moreno, and several images of the Dominguez family. They were integrated into an exhibit on the Mexican Rancho era of Alta California along with a diorama highlighting the life of Maria Amparo Ruiz de Burton who was born in Loreto, lived in La Paz and then came up to the San Diego area after marrying U.S. Army General Henry S. Burton.


Historical Collections Intersect with Pop-Culture Fandom & Fantasy at the 2023 First Fridays Season

The case above contains a movie program for *King Kong* distributed during the 1933 premiere screening at Grauman's Chinese Theatre in Hollywood


